



USING PICTURE BLOCKS FOR TRAINING ON KEY SUSTAINABILITY TOPICS

BACKGROUND

In most Sub-Saharan African countries, cotton produced under rain-fed conditions is typically characterised by low yields of 500-700 kg/ha of seed cotton. Farmers' poor knowledge of more effective and sustainable production techniques constitutes one reason amongst many for this low level of productivity.

TRAINING CONTENTS

By co-financing agricultural trainings, the Cotton Expert House Africa (CHA) supports the cotton companies' cascading extension system to deliver improved and more sustainable cotton production techniques. Based on existing training materials from the Competitive African Cotton Initiative (COMPACI) (2009-2016) and the Aid by Trade Foundation (AbTF), extension staff and smallholder cotton farmers participate in interactive trainings on:

- Good agricultural practices (GAP): early land preparation and planting, correct plant population, early weeding, scouting and threshold spraying.
- Integrated production and pest management (IPPM): scouting techniques, differentiation of harmful and beneficial insects, preparation of bio-fertilisers, bio-pesticides and composting.
- Prevention of child labour: children are only allowed to support non-hazardous tasks and are only allowed to work after school.
- Good practices of gender in agriculture: joint household planning and division of tasks and income-generating activities for women.

Additional training material, including on integrated water and soil management, will be developed in collaboration with technical advisors and the target group. CHA makes all training materials available on the CHA knowledge management platform:
